### Drive safely at all times

Do not use a hand-held phone while driving. Park vour vehicle first.

### Switch off the phone when refuelling

Do not use the phone at a refuelling point (service station) or near fuels or chemicals.

### Switch off in an aircraft

Wireless phones can cause interference. Using them in an aircraft is both illegal and dangerous.

### Switch off the phone near all medical equipment

Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external radio frequency energy. Follow any regulations or rules in force.

#### Interference

All wireless phones may be subject to interference, which could affect their performance.





### Make or answer calls

### Make a call

- In Idle mode, enter an area code and phone number.
  - Press [ ].
     Press [Volume] to adjust the volume.
     During a call, the exposed keys are locked. Press [ i] or [ ] to unlock the keypad.
  - 3. Press [ ?] to end the call.

### Answer a call

- 1. When the phone rings, press [♠].
- 2. Press [ ] to end the call.

### Use the speakerphone feature

During a call, press [i] and then <**Yes**> to activate the speaker.

Press [ i ] again to switch back to the earpiece.

### Make a multi-party call

- During a call, call the second participant.
   The first call is put on hold.
- 2. Press < Options > and select Join.

- Repeat step 1 and 2 to add more participants.
- 4. During a multi-party call:
  - Press <Options> and select Select one → Private to have a private conversation with one participant.
  - Press < Options> and select Select one → Remove to drop one participant.
- 5. Press [ ] to end the multi-party call.

### Use the camera

### Take a photo

- 1. In Idle mode, press and hold [回] to turn on the camera.
- Aim the lens at the subject and make any desired adjustments.
- Press [ i ] or [ o ] to take a photo. The photo is saved automatically.
- Press < Preview > to take another photo.

### Step outside the phone

### View a photo

- In Idle mode, press <Menu> and select My files → Images → My photos.
- 2. Select the photo you want.

### Record a video

- 1. In Idle mode, press and hold [回] to turn on the camera.
  - 2. Press [1] to switch to Record mode.
  - 3. Press [ i ] or [♂] to start recording.

- 4. Press [ i ], < □>, or [o] to stop recording. The video is saved automatically.
- Press < Preview > to record another video.

### View a video

# Copy music files to the phone

Use these methods:

- Download from the wireless web.
- Download from a PC using the optional Samsung PC Studio. See Samsung PC Studio User's Guide.
- · Receive via Bluetooth.
- Copy to a memory card and insert it into the phone.
- Synchronise music files with Windows Media Player. See the next section.



When inserting a memory card with a large amount of files, your phone might work rather slowly for a few minutes while database updates. This may also affect some phone functions. This problem is temporary and is not a phone defect.

### Synchronise with Windows Media Player

You can copy music files to your phone by synchronising with Windows Media Player 11.

In Idle mode, press
 < Menu> and select
 Settings → Phone
 settings → USB settings
 → Media player.

- Connect your phone and PC with an optional PC data cable.
- Select Sync digital media files to this device when a pop-up window appears on your PC.
- Enter the name of your phone and click **Finish**.
- Select and drag the music files you want to the sync list.
- 6. Click Start Sync.
- 7. When synchronisation is finished, disconnect the phone from the PC.

## Play music files

- In Idle mode, press
   < Menu> and select Music
   player.
- 2. Select a music category  $\rightarrow$  a music file.
- During playback, use the following keys:
  - i: pause or resume playback.
  - Left: restart playback. Press to return to the previous file within 3 seconds after the playback has started. Press and hold to scan backward in a file.
  - Right: skip to the next file. Press and hold to scan forward in a file.

- Up: open the playlist.
- Volume: adjust the volume.
- 4. Press [Down] to stop playback.

### Create your playlist

- From the music player screen, press < Options> and select Open playlist → All → Playlists.
- Press < Options > and select Create playlist.
- 3. Enter the title of the playlist and press **Save**>.
- 4. Select the added playlist.
- 5. Press **<Options>** and select **Add** → a source.

- Select a music category → a file, or select the files you want and press <Add>.
- 7. Press [ i ] to play music.

### Listen to the FM radio

### Listen to the radio

- Plug the connecter of the supplied headset into the multi-function jack on the phone.
- In Idle mode, press
   Menu> and select
   Applications → FM radio.
- 3. Press [ i ] to turn on the radio.

- 4. Press [Left] or [Right] to find available radio stations.
- 5. Press [ i ] to turn off the radio.

## Store radio stations

### By automatic tuning:

From the FM radio screen, press **<Options>** and select **Self-tuning**. Available radio stations are automatically saved.

### By manual setup:

- From the FM radio screen, press < Options > and select Add.
- 2. Enter the frequency of the station and press <**Save**>.

In Idle mode, press [  $\underline{\boldsymbol{\imath}}$  ]. The homepage of your service provider opens.

### Navigate the web

- For **Phone**, select a number type.

### Find a contact

- 1. In Idle mode, press < **Contacts**>.
- 2. Enter the first few letters of the name you want.
- 3. Select a contact.
- Scroll to a number and press [ ] to dial, or press [ ] to edit contact information.

## Send messages

### Send a text message

- In Idle mode, press <Menu> and select Messages → Create message → Message.
- Enter destination numbers and press [Down].
- 3. Enter the message text.
- Press **Options**> and select **Send** to send the message.

### Send a multimedia message

- In Idle mode, press
   <Menu> and select
   Messages → Create
   message → Message.
- Enter destination numbers or email addresses and press [Down].
- 3. Enter the message text.
- Press < Options > and select Input field.
- Press [i] to select the input field items and press <Save>.
- 6. Press < Yes>.

- 7. Fill in the fields.
- For attaching files, press
   Options> and select Add attachment → an item.
- Press **Options**> and select **Send** to send the message.

## Send an email

- In Idle mode, press
   Menu> and select
   Messages → Create
   message → Email.
- 2. Enter email addresses and press [Down].
- Enter the subject and message text.

- Press < Options > and select Input field.
- Press [ i ] to select the input field items and press <Save>.
- Fill in the fields.
   For attaching files, press
   Options> and select Add item or Create item → an item.
- Press **Options** and select **Send** to send the email.

### View messages

## View a text message

- In Idle mode, press
   Menu> and select
   Messages → My
   messages → Inbox.
- 2. Select a text message.

### View a multimedia message

- In Idle mode, press <Menu> and select Messages → My messages → Inbox.
- 2. Select a multimedia message.

### View an email

- In Idle mode, press
   Menu> and select
   Messages → My
   messages → Email inbox.
- 2. Select an account.
- Press < Options > and select Check for new email.
- 4. Select an email or a header.
- If you selected a header, press **Options**> and select **Retrieve** to view the body of the email.

### **Use Bluetooth**

Your phone is equipped with Bluetooth technology, enabling you to connect the phone wirelessly to other Bluetooth devices and exchange data with them, talk hands-free, or control the phone remotely.

### Turn on Bluetooth

- In Idle mode, press
   < Menu> and select
   Applications<sup>‡</sup> →
   Bluetooth → Activation →
   On.
  - Bluetooth is available under Applications if the Yahoo! ready or Google service is available.
- Select My phone's visibility → On to allow other devices to locate your phone.

Search for and pair with a Bluetooth device

- In Idle mode, press
   <Menu> and select
   Applications<sup>‡</sup> →
   Bluetooth → My devices
   → Search for new
   devices.
  - # Bluetooth is available under Applications if the Yahoo! ready or Google service is available.
- 2. Select a device.
- Enter a Bluetooth PIN or the other device's Bluetooth PIN, if it has one, and press OK>.

When the owner of the other device enters the same code, pairing is complete.

### Send data

- Access an application, such as Phonebook, My files, Calendar, or Memo.
- 2. Select an item.
- Press < Options > and select Send via → Bluetooth.
- For sending a contact, select which data you want to send.
- 5. Search for and select a device.
- If necessary, enter the Bluetooth PIN and press < OK>.

### Receive data

- When a device attempts to access your phone, press <**Yes**> to permit the connection.
- If necessary, press < Yes> to confirm that you are willing to receive.

Menu	Description
Recent contacts, Missed calls, Dialled calls, Received calls	Check the most recent calls dialled, received, or missed.

Menu	Description
Sent messages, Received messages	View the record of the most recent messages sent or received.
Delete all	Delete all of the records in each call and message type.
Call manager → Call time	Check the time record for calls made and received.
Call manager → Call cost	Check the cost of your calls, if supported by your SIM card.
Call manager → Reject list	Make a list of the phone numbers of callers to reject.

## Phonebook

Menu	Description
Contact list	Search for contact information stored in Phonebook.
Create contact	Add a new contact to Phonebook.
Group	Organise your contacts in caller groups.
Speed dial	Assign a speed dial number for your most frequently dialled numbers.
My namecard	Create a name card and send it to other people.

Menu	Description
Own numbers	Check your phone numbers, or assign a name to each of the numbers.
Management	Manage contacts in Phonebook or change the default settings for Phonebook.
Service number	View the SDN (Service Dialling Number) list assigned by your service provider, if supported by your SIM card.

Access and listen to all music files sorted by criteria. You can also make your own music playlists.

### **Browser**

Menu	Description
Home	Connect your phone to the network and load the homepage of the wireless web service provider.
Enter URL	Enter a URL address and access the associated web page.

Menu	Description
Bookmarks	Save URL addresses in order to quickly access web pages.
Saved pages	Access the list of pages you have saved while online.
History	Access the list of pages you have accessed recently.
Browser settings	Clear the cache. Delete cookies or set whether or not they are stored. Change the settings for the web browser and access version and copyright information about it.

Streaming settings	Select a connection profile to be used for accessing a streaming server.

## Messages

Menu	Description
Create message	Create and send text, multimedia, or email messages.
My messages	Access messages that you have received, sent, or that have failed during sending.
Templates	Make and use templates of frequently used messages or passages.

Menu	Description
Delete all	Delete messages in each message folder all at once.
Settings	Set up various options for using the messaging services.
SOS Messages	Specify options for sending and receiving an SOS message. You can send an SOS message by pressing [Volume] 4 times when the phone is closed and the exposed keys are locked.
Memory status	Check information about the memory currently in use.

### My files

Menu	Description
Images, Videos, Music, Sounds, Other files	Access media files and other files stored in the phone's memory.
Memory card	Access the files stored on a memory card. This menu is only available when you insert a memory card into the phone.
Memory status	Check information about the memory currently in use.

### Calendar

Keep track of your schedule.

#### Camera

Use the camera embedded in your phone to take photos and record videos.

### Yahoo! ready/Google/Bluetooth/ Java world

Depending on your country or service provider, you may have one of these four menus here:

- Yahoo! ready: Launch the Yahoo search engine to find information, news, images, or local services from around the web. You can also use the messenger service.
- Google: Launch the Google search engine to find information, news, images, or local services from around the web.
- **Bluetooth**: Connect the phone wirelessly to other Bluetooth devices.
- Java world: Access Java games and applications.

## **Applications**

Menu	Description
Smart search	Quickly search your phone for any stored information by category. You can access all the results directly from the search screen.
Voice recorder	Record voice memos and any other sounds.
FM radio	Listen to music or news via the FM radio on your phone.
Image editor	Edit your photos using various editing tools.

Menu	Description
Image stamp	Make an outline stamp of a photo and merge it with another photo.
Bluetooth <sup>‡</sup>	Connect the phone wirelessly to other Bluetooth devices.
Java world <sup>‡</sup>	Access Java games and applications.
World clock	Set your local time zone and find out the current time in another part of the world.
Calculator	Perform arithmetic functions.
Converter	Do conversions, such as length and temperature.

Phone settings → Language	Select a language for the display text.
Phone settings → Greeting message	Enter the greeting that is displayed briefly when the phone is switched on.

Menu	Description
Phone settings → Slide settings	Set how the phone reacts when you open it for an incoming call, and when you close it while using a function.
Phone settings → Shortcuts	Use the Navigation keys as shortcuts to access specific menus directly from Idle mode. [Up] is fixed as a shortcut to My menu mode.
Phone settings → My menu	Set up a menu of your own using your favourite menu items, which can be easily accessed by pressing [Up] in Idle mode.

Menu	Description
Phone settings → Volume key	Set how the phone reacts if you press and hold [Volume] when a call comes in.
Phone settings → Extra settings	Change additional settings for using the phone.
Phone settings → Offline mode	Switch the phone to Offline mode, in which the phone functions requiring network connection are deactivated.
Phone settings → USB settings	Select a USB mode that will be used when you connect your phone to a PC via USB interface.

#### SAR certification information

This phone meets European Union (EU) requirements concerning exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed the limits for exposure to radio-frequency (RF) energy, as recommended by the EU Council. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines were developed by independent scientific organisations through the periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The limits include a substantial safety margin designed to ensure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit recommended by the EU Council is  $2.0~\rm W/kg.^1$ 

The highest SAR value for this model phone was 0.645 W/kg.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a base station, the lower the power output of the phone.

 The SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 2.0 watts/kilogram (W/kg) averaged over ten grams of body tissue. The limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements. The SAR values may vary, depending on national reporting requirements and the network band.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, compliance with the European R&TTE Directive must be shown. This directive includes as one of its essential requirements the protection of the health and safety of the user and any other person.

#### Precautions when using batteries

- Never use a charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- · Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power. Talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the service provider.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge, the type of battery, and the charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out.
   When the operation time is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.

- Use only Samsung-approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. Disconnect the charger from the power source when it is not in use. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places because the capacity and lifetime of the battery will be reduced. Try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0° C (32° F).
- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object like a coin, clip or pen causes a direct connection between the + and terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery). For example, do not carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag where the battery may contact metal objects. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.

 Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.

### Road safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When you are driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone while driving, follow local regulations in the country or region you are in.

## **Operating environment**

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in the area you are in, and always switch off your phone whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger.

When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

#### **Electronic devices**

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### **Pacemakers**

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research. If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch off your phone immediately.

### **Hearing aids**

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

#### Other medical devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy.

Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Switch off your phone in health care facilities when regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so.

#### Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle.

You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

#### Posted facilities

Switch off your phone in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

### Potentially explosive environments

Switch off your phone when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch off the phone while at a refuelling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants, or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. To make or receive calls, the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. Switch on the phone.
- 2. Key in the emergency number for your present location. Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press [ . ].

Certain features like Call Barring may need to be deactivated before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

### Other important safety information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts, or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Improperly installed wireless equipment could result in serious injury if the air bag inflates.
- Switch off your phone before boarding an aircraft. It is dangerous and illegal to use wireless phones in an aircraft because they can interfere with the operation of the aircraft.

 Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

#### Care and maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years.

- Keep your phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children and pets. They may accidentally damage these things or choke on small parts.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity, and liquids contain minerals that corrode electronic circuits.
- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.

- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.
- Do not drop, knock, or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or strong detergents to clean the phone. Wipe it with a soft cloth.
- Do not paint the phone. Paint can clog the device's moving parts and prevent proper operation.
